

# Madison County Chamber Dragon Boat Regatta Set for May 18



Dragon Boat Regatta enters its fifth year on the Ross Barnett Reservoir at Old Trace Park in Ridgeland.

Saturday, May 18, 2013, the Madison County Chamber of Commerce will host its fifth annual Dragon Boat Regatta on the Ross Barnett Reservoir at Old Trace Park in Ridgeland.

# Expedition Natchez 1813: Becoming "Old Hickory"

Andrew Jackson's troops will march again from Natchez to Nashville along the Natchez Trace as portrayed by members of the 7th U.S. Living History Association and re-enactors from several states representing the Tennessee Militia of 1813. The April 12-21, 2013, event commemorates the bicentennial of the War of 1812 as it reminds the public of the role of the Natchez Trace in that war. Andrew Jackson earned the name "Old Hickory" while walking each step with his soldiers almost the entire length of the old road in the early spring of 1813.

The portrayals will begin with a 6 p.m. parade in Natchez on Friday, April 12. The military parade will travel from Natchez Under the Hill to the Eola Guest House and Prentiss Club. A living-history educational initiative will be held Saturday, April 13, at Historic Jefferson College.

On Monday, April 15 and Tuesday, April 16, Jackson's Tennessee Militia will be encamped and conducting an educational initiative for the public from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. in Ridgeland, Mississippi, at the Choctaw Agency, National Park Service Information Cabin, Old Trace Site/Brashear's Stand (behind the Mississippi Craft Center) and Old Trace Park on the Reservoir. The public is invited as re-enactors teach eighthgrade students valuable history lessons.

On Wednesday, the re-enactors will travel to Old Pontotoc, Mississippi, making a brief stop at French Camp. They will be encamped at Longbow Trails Thursday and Friday before proceeding through NW Alabama to Tennessee for the final event at The Hermitage Nashville home of Andrew Jackson, Sunday, April 21.

This commemoration continues a four-year partnership among the 7th US Infantry Living History Association, the Natchez Trace Parkway Association and the National Park Service. It will be the first history event to run the entire length of the Natchez Trace Parkway and incorporate both Natchez and Nashville.

# Rice Road Trailhead Project Update



The city's trailhead project was under construction over the winter. A new pavilion with restrooms, picnic tables, bike racks, bicycle service stand and more will be ready for your use this spring.

The Rice Road Trailhead project is nearing completion after experiencing delays during November and December while waiting for special-order, colored concrete blocks to arrive. The blocks have since been delivered, and the walls are built. While the project experienced delays, it will be ready for your enjoyment in March.

Remaining work on the project includes installing a metal roof system, plumbing fixtures, lighting and wiring, heavy-duty picnic tables, decorative bike racks and trash receptacles, and landscaping. The existing gravel parking lot will remain closed during construction. The parking lot will be resurfaced with recycled asphalt at the end of the project. A bicycle service stand will be an added feature to the project, and will include the tools necessary for performing basic repairs and maintenance such as changing a flat tire and adjusting brakes.

# Jackson Street Trail Project Planned in Ridgeland

The City of Ridgeland will be constructing an extension to the multiuse trail system in Ridgeland, Mississippi. Trace Ridge subdivision will be connected to an existing trail located on the east side of Highway 51 at Jackson Street. An asphalt path will be built along the south side of Jackson Street adjacent to Trace Station Shopping Center and extend 1/3-mile to Trace Ridge Drive.

"This multiuse path will link Trace Ridge subdivision with existing paths that run west toward Jackson Street's pedestrian-friendly market area. Avid riders will enjoy connecting

at Highway 51 and Jackson Street and riding along a scenic route that parallels the Natchez Trace Parkway to connect with local attractions such as the Mississippi Craft Center and Ross Barnett Reservoir," said Chris Bryson, engineer, City of Ridgeland.

On Oct. 9, 2012, the Mississippi Transportation Commission (MTC) approved up to \$300,000 in Federal Transportation Enhancement (TE) funds to be used toward City of Ridgeland projects. The City has chosen to apply this funding to the construction of the Jackson Street multiuse path along the south side of Jackson Street.

According to Bryson, this project is part of the "2035 Jackson Urbanized Area Transportation Plan, Volume III Bicycle and Pedestrian Facilities Plan." The total estimated cost for this project is \$293,050. The associated federal funds will be administered to the City through MDOT's Local Public Agency program.

Residents of Trace Ridge subdivision in Ridgeland who use the existing multiuse trail express their interest in the project. "As an avid user of the Trace trail, I welcome the new trail extension," said Doug Cowart. "I typically enjoy jogging on the trail two to four times per week. Having safe access to the main trail is great for all that live in the Trace Ridge subdivision."

Melinda Simmons said, "As a frequent user of the multiuse trails and a resident of Trace Ridge, I couldn't be happier about the extension of the trail to Trace Ridge neighborhood. Running or cycling even that short stretch of Jackson Street during times of traffic or after dark has always made me a little bit nervous. This project is a great solution! It is already so convenient to have the trails nearby, and now, with a special trail to link the neighborhood, it will be safer for everyone to connect to and enjoy the trails."

"My family and I would be very excited to have easier access to the trails," said resident Lori Held. "Right now we have to drive and park to use the trails because I don't want my three- and four-year-olds walking or riding their bikes on Jackson Street. It would be very nice and much safer to have the trail extend from Highway 51 over to the entrance to our subdivision."

Construction on the Jackson Street multiuse trail is estimated to begin in the summer of 2014 and finish by spring 2015.

# Help Preserve Property Values with the Correct Storage of Garbage Cans and Recycle Carts

The Community Development Department is asking for your help in preserving property values by complying with all sections of the Property Maintenance Code of the City of Ridgeland. In particular, Code Enforcement Officers have observed a growing number of violations with garbage cans and recycle carts that are being improperly stored.

Section 307.4 states that "garbage or refuse containers (and recycle bins) shall be stored behind the front line of the building (or house) and shall not be visible from the street, except when placed for collection or when stored in an open carport or garage."

What this means is that garbage and recycle containers may not be stored in front of the house where they can be seen from the street. Many residents will place their containers behind the house. An open carport, even though you can see the containers from the street or a garage are acceptable locations for storage.

Code Enforcement Officer Drew Smith commented, "Some of our residents are having trouble finding a good location for their new recycle bin. Some residents just don't know that containers need to be stored in accordance with the regulation." If you have space constraints and need to exchange your recycle cart for a smaller 18-gallon recycle bin, you may contact the Public Works Department at 601-853-2027.

# Ridgeland "Sow and Grow" Community Garden



The Ridgeland Community Garden is seeking sponsors and volunteers. This spring, raised beds will be installed. Fresh vegetables will be donated to those in need in Ridgeland.

The City of Ridgeland wants to be the healthiest city in Mississippi. Eating nutritious foods including fresh vegetables and fruits is an important element of living a healthy life. A Healthy Hometown Committee was formed three years ago to work toward obtaining a grant from Blue Cross Blue Shield Foundation of Mississippi and to offer as many opportunities as possible for its residents to be healthy.

Ridgeland resident Jerry Williams responded to the request for citizen involvement in the City's Healthy Hometown Committee the second year. When he heard about the desire for a community garden, he volunteered right away and made it his project. The city donated land next to City Hall for the garden.

Williams said, "I had completed my master gardener program and decided this project would help me earn hours toward my annual obligation. After two meetings, I was appointed project chairman."

Williams formed a committee, developed a plan and began to work on it. It took seven weeks from the initial meeting to the day plants were put in the ground.

Mike McCollum, Director of Public Works, played a large role in getting the garden plowed by staff, an irrigation system installed and soil added. David Overby, the director of finance and administration and city clerk at the time, also assisted with the project.

The garden committee developed a design, application and guidelines. Flyers were distributed around the city, and newspapers published stories. Volunteers came out to work their own beds and to keep the vegetables they raised.

The following year, the committee decided to donate the produce to MadCAAP. Several pounds of vegetables were delivered to help the needy of Madison County.

This year, plans are a little different. Vegetables will still be donated, but the committee plans to work with area churches to find local recipients of the fresh produce. Raised beds will be installed to increase the drainage and help make it a more productive garden.



Public Schools in Ridgeland Prepare Students for Successful Future

Public school systems are often the dark horse in any academic race. Ridgeland, in particular, may be a pleasant surprise due to the quality of education and abundance of resources. Madison County Schools, Ridgeland zone offers a comprehensive route to the future through a wide variety of programs dedicated to helping students excel. "Our curriculum is designed to meet the students wherever they are," Ridgeland High School Principal Sharon Summers says. "By the time they leave our school, every student is college or career ready."

Among available options at Ridgeland High School are ACT and PSAT preparation classes, college credits and tutoring, which is offered before, after and even during the school day. In each of the core subjects, general, accelerated and College Board Advanced Placement levels are available.

Ridgeland High's "dual enrollment" program gives students the chance

to get an early start on college. With this program, any senior is allowed to take classes at both the high school and Holmes Community College's Ridgeland campus. "I love it," Principal Summers said of the program. "It's another way for students to earn college credit."

Pathways, the gifted program, is unique to the lower public schools. "Pathways allows hands-on learning," Olde Towne Middle School teacher Carla Belk says. "Students learn in a less structured environment while focusing on areas in leadership, communication, problem-solving, group dynamics and creativity, just to name a few." Her students have hosted a school-wide mock election, presented a regular "Titan TV" broadcast and entered the MS Secretary of State-sponsored political cartoon competition. Meanwhile, at Ann Smith and Highland Elementary, Pathways teacher Ellen Litton has helped her children design their own works of art, discover the game of chess and raise more than \$400 for the local animal shelter during their "canine unit."

Another thing that sets this school zone apart is its faculty. Madison County Schools teachers are required to attend summer workshops and recertify regularly. All are encouraged to be versatile, and assets to enhance learning are never far from their minds. The administration encourages forward-thinking by offering the latest resources such as smart boards, Mimio products and other interactive teaching technology.

Beginning next year, the RHS business department will let students pursue career paths early. By creating electives based on a student's chosen field, be it digital videography or graphic design, an RHS student can get a jumpstart on a specific career. This career-driven elective program will enhance the student's skills and better prepare them for life after graduation. Ridgeland's dedicated faculty allows it to provide a plethora of options that are universally beneficial and can travel with a student to aid in college and career.



#### Freedom Ridge Park

235 West School Street - Freedom Ridge Park, a 50-acre athletic facility, is located on School Street just behind the Ridgeland Police Department. 

# Therapy Dogs Serve at Ann Smith Elementary



Darby visits Ann Smith Elementary School

Ann Smith Elementary has some special friends named Darby and Betsy, who help our counselor, Judi Sharpe. While these friends are the same age as many of the students, they come to school with their owner, Carol Beasley, to do special work. Darby (8) and Betsy (4) are therapy dogs, certified by Therapy Dogs International (TDI). Therapy dogs provide emotional support to people in various circumstances. They differ from service dogs in that service dogs are more highly trained to provide services like search and rescue, medical and guide dog services, to name just a few. Any breed of dog can become a therapy dog as long as they can pass the certification, which includes ensuring the dog has an ideal temperament for this type of work. Mrs. Carol Beasley's dogs are both accustomed to being around children. They are happy getting petted or doing simple tricks.

Studies have shown that contact with therapy animals can bring great comfort and reduce anxiety. Currently the dogs attend small-group sessions led by the counselor and the children love them. Books (usually including a dog) may also be read to the students. In the past Mrs. Beasley and one of the dogs have worked one-on-one, reading with a child. Children who may be self-conscious reading out-loud in front of peers can read to Darby or Betsy; this creates enthusiasm for reading and building their self-esteem. Mrs. Beasley, Darby and Betsy welcome invitations to visit children in any classroom or other setting at Ann Smith. Recently, they visited Mrs. Litton's Pathways classes to educate the students about therapy dogs.

Mrs. Beasley has a personal connection with Ann Smith; she has had grandchildren at the school for the past seven years, and her daughter, Dixie Livingston, serves as PTO president. Ann Smith Elementary is very thankful for the volunteer services provided by Mrs. Beasley, Darby and Betsy.


