What a solution of the solutio

Thy does spellcheck always flag "Harbour" when I type it in an address? Why did Ridgeland choose the "British" way of spelling this? This drove me crazy until I learned that the British had nothing to do with it. Lake Harbour Drive is named for Hall Harbour, who served as Mayor of Ridgeland from 1957 to 1961.

Several of our streets are named for former mayors. I lived on Porter Street for over eight years and did not know it was named for our first mayor, R. L. Porter (1900 to 1909). Yellowly Lane (though mispelled) is named for the Yellowley family. James Brownlow Yellowley was mayor from 1909 to 1911. Others are Adcock Drive (Earl Adcock 1941 to 1951), Ridgeway Drive (M.B. Ridgeway 1961 to 1966), Wolcott Circle (Hite Wolcott 1966 to 1973 & 1977 to 1989) and McCormack Drive (D. F. McCormack 1973 to 1977).


Long-time, well-known families are also honored with street names:

Brame, Broadfoot, Hawthorne, Carr, Moon, Millett, Perkins, Wheatley, Mary Harris and Ike Henderson to name a few. The Brame, Broadfoot and Carr families owned land and farmed in the area. The Mary Harris family descends from Patience Harris, a favored slave from the Yellowley Plantation, and have lived on their family property for over 100 years.

The Moon, Millett and Wheatley families and Ike Henderson lived and worked in Ridgeland. Col. Jesse Perkins and his wife Mary owned much of the land around Ridgeland. Their daughter, Jessamine Perkins Yellowley, (after whom Jessamine Cemetery is named) was the wife of James Brownlow Yellowley.

People, places and events from our history appear in development and street names. Old Agency Road is named for the Tribal Agency located in this area in the early 1800s. The Dinsmor subdivision is named for the first Choctaw Tribal Agent Silas Dinsmor, who served from 1802 to 1814. Silas' Meadow is named for him. Born in Windham, NH, Silas "Dinsmoor" was agent when The Natchez Trace was only a narrow cleared path from Natchez to Nashville. Over the years many notables (like President Thomas Jefferson) misspelled his last name. So, two centuries later, "Dinsmor" is the accepted spelling.

But, where did the name "Robbers' Trace" come from? It is based on stories (probably true) of highwaymen



(robbers) that went up and down the Trace, relieving travelers of their possessions.

Early developers, Nichols and Treakle, named Central Street for the Illinois Central Railroad, which played an important role in the growth of Ridgeland. They also named another street "Chicago Avenue"

because they were from Illinois. However, this street was later renamed "Sunnybrook Road".

We are a "Tree City" and there are many streets named for trees - peach, pear, pine, cherry laurel, maple, oak, red bud, pecan, willow, cherry, walnut and hickory. Wait... Hickory? Where is that street? Hickory Hill was located on the east side of Wheatley Drive. On July 5, 1994 the name was changed to Faith Hill, in honor of the music star who lived on the street when she was a child.

A CONVERSATION WITH...

Q: TELL ME A LITTLE ABOUT YOURSELF AND YOUR FAMILY

A: I am a wife and the mother of two children. I have a six-year-old little girl and a nine-year-old boy. I live in Brandon, and I was born in Denver, Colorado. We also have three dogs ranging from 18 pounds to a 90-pound 8-month-old puppy.

Q: BEING BORN IN DENVER, HOW DID YOU LAND IN MISSISSIPPI?

A: We had family here. We moved to Richland, where my grandparents lived, and we lived there for a couple of years. I attended Florence schools throughout my entire childhood, Kindergarten through 12th grade.

Q: YOU HAVE ACQUIRED DEGREES, CERTIFICATES, OR WORK EXPERIENCE IN VARIOUS VOCATIONS OVER THE YEARS. TELL ME MORE ABOUT THAT.

A: I sometimes feel like I've done about every job under the sun! I went to Ole Miss, and my initial major was psychology, but I later changed that to occupational therapy. After a while, I took a break from Ole Miss, and decided to get my barber's certificate from Hinds Community College. After I became a barber, I decided to go back to Ole Miss and major in graphic design. This was also the same time that I became a tattoo artist. Being a tattoo artist was a really great college job, and I made good money for a student! But, again, I decided to switch majors from graphic design to sculpture. It wasn't long after I switched to sculpture that I realized I didn't have the mindset for gallery shows, and I eventually graduated with a Bachelor's Degree in Art.

Q: WHAT DID YOU DO AFTER COLLEGE?

A: I lived in Oxford for about ten years. After I had my first child, we decided it would be best to live closer to family. We moved back, and I took a job at a local staffing agency. It was through working at that staffing agency that I got hired by the City of Ridgeland.

Q: HOW LONG HAVE YOU BEEN WITH THE CITY?

A: A little over four years.

Q: YOU RECENTLY GOT YOUR CERTIFICATION AS A DEPUTY CLERK. WHAT IS THE PROCESS TO OBTAIN THAT?

A: It was a lot of fun! It's a three-year commitment. Training was twice a year with two-and-a-half days of instruction each time. I learned all things related to running a city – utility funds, government structure, public administration, record keeping, technology – I can go on and on and on. We learned a little bit about everything, and I really enjoyed it! That's one of the reasons I've had so many jobs is because I like learning new things and being given new challenges.

Q: WHAT IS YOUR CURRENT JOB TITLE AND WHAT DOES THAT ENTAIL?

A: I am in charge of purchasing, and I am also the receptionist for the administration department. The bulk of my work consists of processing purchase orders within each department in the city. I verify invoices associated with each purchase for legal compliance and then pass the invoices on to accounts payable for payment. My other duties include greeting guests who have an appointment with the mayor or other administrative officials. I also assist the administration department in various areas like new employee applications, privilege license applications, and record requests; and I oversee the maintenance and inspection of the elevator, fire alarm system, sprinkler system, and other components within the building of city hall.

Q: YOU'VE RECENTLY ACCEPTED A PROMOTION WITH A NEW TITLE. WHAT WILL BE YOUR NEW DUTIES?

A: I will be the Utility Billing Supervisor in the Water Department. I will oversee the billing of Ridgeland's water customers, which involves a series of processes such as meter readings, meter sets and swaps, service orders, new account establishment, payment processing, service disconnects, refunds, bank drafts, customer service calls, payment processing, and various other tasks.

Q: WHAT DO YOU LIKE TO DO IN YOUR SPARE TIME?

A: I like gardening. That is my true happy place!

WHAT IS STORMWATER?

Stormwater is water from rain that does not soak into the ground. It flows from rooftops, over paved areas, bare soil, and sloped lawns. As it flows, stormwater collects and transports animal waste, litter, pesticides, fertilizers, oil and grease, soil, and other potential pollutants.

WHAT'S THE PROBLEM?

Rain events wash pollutants from land, streets, and construction sites into storm sewers and drainage ditches. Eventually, these empty the polluted stormwater directly into our streams, rivers and ultimately the Ross Barnett Reservoir with no treatment.

Polluted stormwater degrades our lakes, rivers, wetlands, reservoir, and other waterways. Nutrients such as phosphorous and nitrogen can cause the overgrowth of algae resulting in oxygen depletion in waterways. Toxic substances from motor vehicles and careless application of pesticides and fertilizers threaten water quality and can kill fish and other aquatic life. Bacteria from animal wastes and improper connections to storm sewer systems can make lakes and waterways unsafe for wading, swimming, and fish consumption. Eroded soil is a pollutant as well. It can cloud waterways and interfere with the habitat of fish and plant life.



THERE ARE MANY TYPES OF POLLUTANTS THAT FIND THEIR WAY INTO STORM DRAINS. SOME COMMON POLLUTANTS FOUND IN STORM SEWERS AND DRAINAGEWAYS INCLUDE:

- Animal Waste
- Litter
- Motor oil
- Yard clippings
- Fertilizers and pesticides
- Soapy car wash water
- Eroded sediment from construction sites

It's important to remember that any type of surface water runoff, not just rainfall, can run into the storm sewer and collect in the stormwater management system. For example, when you wash your car on the driveway, that water, dirt, and grime can end up in the system. That's why we need to be careful with what we put into the storm sewers as traces of all this material can end up in the stormwater system and our local waterways.

WHAT CAN YOU DO TO PREVENT STORMWATER POLLUTION IN RIDGELAND?

- 1. Remember: Only rain belongs in the drain!
- 2. Wash your car over your lawn or gravel.
- 3. Keep your car well maintained.
- 4. Consider disconnecting your downspouts and rerouting the water into a rain garden.
- 5. Use lawn or garden chemicals sparingly.
- 6. Plant native, low maintenance plants and grasses.
- 7. Minimize runoff by not over-watering your lawn and garden.
- 8. Clean up pet waste.
- 9. Consider minimizing impervious surfaces around your home.
- 10. Do not drain your pool, spa, or fountain to a storm drain.
- Make sure storm drain outfalls are not running in dry weather. If it hasn't rained in 72 hours, it should not be flowing. Call Ridgeland public works at (601) 853-2027 if it does.
- 12. Properly maintain your neighborhood stormwater pond.
- 13. Install a rain barrel or cistern to capture roof runoff.
- 14. Walk, bike, or share a ride when possible.

GREEK KITCHEN IN RIDGELAND CELEBRATES ANNIVERSARY, AWARDS, AND AMERICAN CITIZENSHIP

Ridgeland restauranteurs, Despina and Stefano Mangafakis, have a lot of reasons to be grateful. Known as Yiayia and Pappou (Greek for grandmother and grandfather, respectfully) to friends, family, and regulars, the gratefulness and joy emanated by this sweet couple is apparent from the moment you walk in the door; and if their beautiful Greek accents wouldn't deceive the ears accustomed to American English, you'd believe they were born and raised in the Hospitality State.

But, in fact, it was only around seven years ago when they started calling Mississippi their home.

"When I was 21, my husband and I moved from Greece to Connecticut, where we also owned restaurants, and we lived there until we moved to Mississippi several years ago," Mangafakis said, "but my true love for this country didn't happen until we moved to Mississippi. The people here know how to eat; know how to pray; and know how to love. They care about others as they care about their own. Their hospitality reminds me of Greece, and I feel like this is my home now."

Mangafakis and her husband made the decision to move to Mississippi to be closer to family. "My son married a girl from Brandon, and they gave us two beautiful grandsons, but seven years ago, they decided to move from Connecticut to her home state of Mississippi," Mangafakis said. "It was hard being away from them, and one Christmas, my husband and I packed up everything and moved to Mississippi."



Fast-forward a half decade. The proud owners of Yiayia's Greek Kitchen just celebrated their five-year anniversary and were recently awarded the 2022 Gold Award by the global organization Greek Taste Beyond Borders for their Authentic Greek Cuisine. Mangafakis is proud of her heritage and the ability to share her gift of authentic Greek cooking with her customers. "We only wanted to open a small restaurant when we moved to Mississippi, but it's continued to grow

because we are known for our authentic Greek cuisine that can't be found anywhere else," she explained. "The ingredients and recipes are the same we used in Greece. I haven't changed a thing."

Another proud moment for Mangafakis arose when she finished all her courses to become an American citizen and recently traveled to New Orleans to accept her official citizenship. "I didn't even think about getting my citizenship until I moved to Mississippi, but for the first time since I left Greece so many years ago, I finally feel like I'm at home in Mississippi, Mangafakis beamed, "and I thank God every day because I live in the most wonderful place."

Digging Deep for *Rewards and Awards*

A t the back of this magazine there is a listing of people, departments and contact information to help "Ridgelanders" with questions, problems and emergencies. There is also a listing of City Meetings that shows various committees that have been established to assist the City and its various departments in adherence to City Ordinances. Appointed by the Mayor and Aldermen, these committees are essential to the City of Ridgeland.

While most of the committees deal with meetings and LOTS of paperwork, there is one that gets "down and dirty" on a regular basis. Originally established as the Beautification Committee, Keep Ridgeland Beautiful was accredited with Keep America Beautiful/Keep Mississippi Beautiful in 2014 and has earned President's Circle and Circle of Excellence honors every year since. Twelve talented and dedicated women have served on this eight-member committee. They work with several City departments, the schools and other organizations, as well as other state affiliates on projects like planting flowers and trees in our parks and on the trails, building gardens, and promoting recycling in schools. This hard work has been acknowledged with numerous awards from Keep America Beautiful, Keep Mississippi Beautiful and America in Bloom.

National awards include two large matching grants, one for \$25K in 2019 and another for \$50K in 2021, from America in bloom and Canadian National Railroad. These funds were used to plant trees on Highland Colony Parkway and Colony Park Boulevard. Keep Ridgeland By Ginger Cocke, DAR Member

Beautiful (KRB) and several City departments worked together to acquire the grants. In 2021 Ridgeland also won the Overall Impression Award presented by America in Bloom that recognizes a community that is welcoming, attractive and well designed and has good maintenance policies and plans in place.

While we are happy to receive these accolades, the real reward is seeing the results of the hard work put into our projects. It is so gratifying to see people walking through the wildflower field, enjoying the flowers, butterflies and sculptures. Many homes and offices have been brightened by bouquets from the zinnia field. And many hearts are touched as people sit at the pavilion at Freedom Ridge to reflect in the DAR Never Forget Garden. Seeing the pride a student has in his or her participation in a project like recycling, gardening or designing and building a structure is beyond words.

We enjoy working with other Keep Mississippi Beautiful affiliates on projects around the state. These projects include refreshing a park in Hazlehurst, building a playground/park in Flora, planting a fruit orchard in Jackson and building a community garden in Belzoni. Other state affiliates came to Ridgeland to help us refurbish Midway Park by planting trees and shrubs and installing a pergola and playground equipment. Every year we participate in the Pearl River Cleanup Project, helping to remove trash and litter from the reservoir area. It is always fun to join the Historical Society and Ridgeland Garden Club helping the Recreation and Parks Department decorate the Plaza at Old Town Crossing for the Christmas Tree Lighting Event. Annually we prepare the Litter Index Report for Keep America Beautiful. With Georgia Myrick of Code Enforcement giving directions, we ride through various areas of the City to rate the amount of litter on the streets, in the ditches and in the yards. This is one of many reports and activities that must be done to meet requirements for President's Circle and Circle of Excellence.

The Household Hazardous Waste Collection event is a joint effort with the City of Madison and MS Department of Environmental Quality. Volunteers from Keep Ridgeland/ Madison Beautiful join Recreation and Parks, Public Works and the Police Department, working many hours (in the hot sun!) to pull off this event. We are constantly looking for ways to make this event more accessible to the residents of Madison County.

Using a Pepsi grant from Keep America Beautiful, we created a mascot...Recycle Ranger... to enhance the recycle program in Ridgeland. He has appeared at KidFest, Balloon Glow, The Christmas Parade and several other City activities. The Ranger is loved by kids and adults alike.

KRB works hand-in-hand with personnel from Public Works, Recreation & Parks and Community Development. They attend our meetings, present ideas and give their full support. We also receive full support from the

Mayor and Board of Aldermen and we are happy to "show off" the awards won on behalf of the City. We gratefully acknowledge the contributions from prior KRB members and former City personnel who gave so much of their time and effort.

Have you noticed...The recurrent theme in all of these activities is COOPERATION!! None of these awards, projects or activities were accomplished by ONE person. In every instance, teachers, students, city departments and personnel and other civic groups have joined with us as we worked to fulfill our mission..."To inspire, educate and lead residents to take daily actions to beautify and improve the City of Ridgeland."



This Road Map to Becoming a Doctor goes through Ridgeland High *Alumni inspire others to follow their dreams*

The journey through medical or dental school is a lengthy process, yet one of which many Ridgeland High graduates undertake. This year alone, 3 of the 160 new Doctor of Medicine degrees awarded to the University of Mississippi Medical Center (UMMC) Class of 2022 are Ridgeland High Titans!

Martin McCandless, RHS class of 2015, is a fourth-year medical student at UMMC. Fourth-year students conduct rotations in specialties of interest prior to applying for residency programs. Martin spent the month of July at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minnesota. Impressively, the Mayo Clinic has been ranked the No. 1 hospital in the nation for six straight years!

Ridgeland High alumni also have a high acceptance rate into the Ole Miss Early Entry Pharmacy Program, an accelerated program in which students graduate with a Bachelor's Degree in Pharmaceutical Sciences and a Pharm D degree in seven years.

Dr. Allen Richert, a member of the UMMC Department of Psychiatry and Human Behavior, and the father of two Titan graduates and a current senior, is proud to encounter Ridgeland High alumni thriving at UMMC Medical Center. "Titans are succeeding in a variety of healthcare careers, including medicine, dentistry, medical research, pharmacy, nursing and allied health fields. In fact, several days a week I work with a nurse who is a Titan alumna!"

Ameley and Lamley Lawson, two Titan sisters who graduated from Ridgeland High School almost a decade apart, find their career pathways converging. Currently a second-year medical student at Yale School of Medicine, Lamley did scientific research and served in the Peace Corps before medical school. Ameley, RHS '17, Rhodes College '21, earned a Masters in Biomedical Sciences at UMMC this year and is preparing to apply to med school in the future.

In pursuit of their chosen health-care careers, siblings Morgan ('17) and Justin ('13) McCray's road map first took them to Copiah-Lincoln Community College and Southwest Community College, respectively, where they played basketball; followed by two years at the University of Mississippi. Dr. Justin McCray, DMD, Case Western Reserve University School of

Dental Medicine '21, is a resident in pediatric dentistry at Case Western Reserve and University Hospitals Rainbow Babies and Children's Hospital, and Morgan is a senior in college.

"I never thought growing up that I could be a doctor," said Justin. My career path to dentistry just as easily could not have happened. I was sitting in class my freshman year of college and my dad texted me, 'Son, you need to be thinking about what you want to be when you grow up.' At that moment I googled top jobs in the United States, and dentistry was number one. I knew that I needed to spend some time in the field to see if I would enjoy this as a career path. The very next day, I reached out to a dentist to set up a time where I could watch him while he worked."

"One Tuesday morning, while I was shadowing a local dentist, a patient came to the clinic with extremely sore gums because of his dentures. After about an hour, the dentist returned with the patient's adjusted dentures. As the patient tried on the new dentures, he began to cry. He said,

'For twenty years, my gums have been hurting. I thought that this was how dentures were supposed to feel. From the bottom of my heart, thank you.' Once I witnessed this occurrence, I knew then that dentistry was for me. I saw firsthand the direct impact that a dentist has on a person's life."

Justin's sister Morgan will enter UMMC next fall as part of the Mississippi Rural Physicians Scholarship Program. For Morgan, career day in elementary school provides an early memory related to her career trajectory. "In second grade, for career day, I decided to dress up as a pediatrician," said Morgan. "At the time, I did not know what becoming a pediatrician entailed. I only knew that my pediatric doctor helped me feel better when no one else could. However, as I have gotten older, I have shifted my mindset from dreams to reality. I, myself, have never been treated by an African American physician. Due to the lack of representation, I began questioning my own capabilities. It is my goal to show other young

people that look like me, that they too are capable. The journey to becoming a doctor will continue to be challenging, but it is one that I am up for!"

Morgan began shadowing doctors in the medical field her senior year of high school. "As an undergraduate I have participated in programs dedicated to helping minority students increase exposure in the health science field. Programs like the Summer Health Professions Education Program, Mississippi IDeA Network of Biomedical Research, Louis Stokes Mississippi Alliance for Minority Participation Program- Increasing Minority Access to Graduate Education (LSMAMP-IMAGE), and the Mississippi Rural Physicians Scholarship Program have allowed me to gain knowledge and experience while networking with professionals in my field of interest, ultimately confirming my career goal."

"Each Titans' road map looks unique," Morgan offered. "Continue to stay motivated when faced with obstacles."

Justin McCray shares something simple that helped him through the process. "Write down your aspirations, put it where you can see it every day. Seeing your dreams in your own handwriting makes the task personal. Dive deep into the field you are interested in, read about the profession, and pay close attention to what it takes to become that professional.

"I still have my note hanging up, that I wrote 10 years ago," Justin said. "'I will be a dentist.' it says. In the end, I am very appreciative of my dad for inspiring me, and for the journey that transpired."
