

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THE HISTORICAL SOCIETY OF RIDGELAND



ONE IN 60 SECONDS... I did not see the movie, but that was my first thought when I RECEIVED A TEXT AT 4:36 A.M. ON MONDAY, JUNE 19 - JUST HOURS AFTER VOTING TO CHANGE THE NAME OF THE METHODIST CHURCH ON JACKSON STREET TO "OLD TOWN WESLEY CHURCH."

The historic Wesley Chapel was destroyed by an EF1 tornado. The utter devastation shown in the accompanying photo mirrors the heartbreak of church members and Ridgeland residents alike.

The chapel was built in the late 1800s near the intersection of County Line Road and Old Canton Road. In 1901, it was dismantled, numbered, loaded on a wagon, and moved to Jackson Street in the Village of Ridgeland. The first Pastor, J.G. Moore, was paid \$100 to reassemble the structure, and it served as the sanctuary for Ridgeland United Methodist Church until 1960.

Since then, it has been moved a couple of times to allow for building projects and parking. It was used for Sunday School and other church functions before being mainly relegated to storage. Several repairs were made to improve the structure in the last few years, including a new roof, updated electrical work, and other minor changes. Covid and other roadblocks delayed a major remodel of the chapel, but the dream never died.

At this time, the future of the Wesley Chapel is uncertain. If it cannot be rebuilt, several pieces of the structure survived that may be used to commemorate the little chapel we have all loved for so long.


GONE, BUT NOT FORGOTTEN... Anyone who has ever walked through a cemetery is familiar with this phrase. Unfortunately, early structures in The Village of Ridgeland were not built to last, or they were destroyed in the fire of 1902. But, as the words on the gravestones say, our history is not forgotten.

The Ridgeland History Trail will tell the story of early Ridgeland with trail markers. The first marker will be placed at City Hall. It highlights the founding of the City and two early mayors. Approximately twenty-five markers are in production. By utilizing the existing trail system, sidewalks, and additional "off-trail" sites, the markers will be easily accessible. Keep a lookout as the Ridgeland History Trail grows over the next few months!

A few of the markers will highlight the history of Brashear's Stand, The Natchez Trace, Silas Dinsmoor, Ridgeland's Prehistoric Past, Highway 51, Jessamine Cemetery, Northpark, Old Town, Simon Hill Church, and many more people, places, and events. The result will be a Trail attracting visitors and residents alike. The first sign will be installed this fall - a perfect time to get out, see the City, and learn more about our history.

You are also invited to visit the History Room at City Hall. In the coming months, the City will announce a date for unveiling the First Families of Ridgeland exhibit. At that time, a press event will be held to present new and upcoming History Trail markers. Photos, letters, and artifacts of the First Families are being gathered for this exhibit. We are starting with five or six families but will add others as additional information is obtained.







Goodrich has announced football and baseball games for the Titans since Ridgeland High opened in 2002, and while his face may not be familiar to all, his voice that carries over the field on Friday Night Lights is a hallmark of the Titan sports landscape.

Page has led a most interesting and full life and keeps writing more chapters. He has lived in many places in the United States and traveled extensively to 50 countries!

Page moved back to Mississippi two decades ago "to his roots," he says. He is a second-generation sports media figure. Son of Mississippi Sports Hall of Fame




