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

TELLING RIDGELAND'S STORY: THE EVOLUTION OF THE HISTORICAL SOCIETY OF RIDGELAND

When planning and designing a flower bed, I was told that plants, especially shrubs, go through three stages. First, they crawl. Next, they walk. Finally, they run! The Historical Society of Ridgeland has evolved in much the same way.

The Historical Society of Ridgeland was established fifteen years ago this month. On September 24, 2009, a group of twelve residents met at the invitation of Sandra Monohan. Public Affairs Coordinator for the City at the time, she was also the first editor of Ridgeland Life. After hearing a presentation by Presley Posey, former branch manager of Flora Library and local history coordinator for the Madison County



Library System, it was decided to form the Historical Society of Ridgeland. In November, committees were appointed to propose a slate of officers and establish by-laws for the Society. Banners that read "Historical Society of Ridgeland...Telling Ridgeland's Story" were printed and placed on a car in the Christmas Parade. We were on our way!

Membership has fluctuated over the years, and several of our charter members have passed away. But we "crawled" through the first years, gathering information, photos, and artifacts on the "First Families" of Ridgeland. We led a tour of Jessamine Cemetery and held public meetings where presentations were made by the Sturdivant family, descendants of Patience Harris, and Binford Watkins, the first Police Chief of Ridgeland.

When the Historical Committee was formed, we started "walking" toward our




Formation meeting of the Historical Society of Ridgeland, 2009

mission of gathering historical data and educating the residents of Ridgeland. The original "Village" was designated as Old Town, Northeast Madison Street was renamed "Old Town Crossing," and a historical marker was erected at the Plaza to commemorate the chartering of The Village of Ridgeland. The Society was also given a significant role in the Annual Christmas Tree Lighting event. The northern part of Wheatley Drive was renamed "Carr Farms Road," and "Telling Ridgeland's Story" became a regular feature in Ridgeland Life.

When the newly constructed City Hall was completed in 2021, a dedicated space was provided for the City's official History Room. We started "running" to get everything sorted and documented. Displays had to be designed. This room houses archived photos, newspaper clippings, maps, and other important artifacts. Last fall, the "First Families" display was opened to the public at a press event. It can be viewed anytime City Hall is open.

But we are not done yet! City Director of Public Relations Kim Cooper suggested that we set up a "virtual tour" of the History Room that could be accessed through the City webpage. Working with Think Webstore, Kim led the launch

of the virtual space. This effort was also made possible by Nancy Batson, Curator and Chair of the Historical Committee, from the numerous years of collecting and cataloging our historical archives. The Virtual History Room is now available on the homepage of the City's website. You are invited to visit the History Room, and we hope you will share this information with your family and friends.

For two years, we have been telling you about another special project in the works. With support from Ridgeland Tourism and several talented City staffers, the Historical Committee has completed twenty-two interpretive signs for the Ridgeland History Trail that will run through the City. These markers will be fully installed by early fall.

THE STORY OF OUR OFFICIAL CITY TREE



The City of Ridgeland has recently designated the pecan as the Official Tree of Ridgeland in honor of the 125th anniversary. On Tuesday, July 16, during the Mayor and Board of Aldermen meeting, the 125th Anniversary Planning Committee joined for photos to commemorate the occasion, which included the reading and signing of the Resolution.

The pecan tree is one of the first documented crops planted in the Highland Colony of Ridgeland. By 1898, nearly 1,400 pecan trees had been planted, 100 acres of which were planted by Gorton Nichols and R.H. Thompson, two of the owners of the Highland Colony Company. The Nichols & Thompson's Grafted Stock Pecan, as they named it, was a large, fancy, paper-shelled pecan that they believed to be the beginnings of a lucrative industry.

The Highland Colony area was settled in the late 19th century for its agricultural promise, and quickly became one of Mississippi's principal areas for truck farming. Known for its adaptable soil, which was perfect for producing a wide variety of fruits and vegetables, the area was especially noted for its strawberry fields and peach, pear, and pecan orchards.

Today, the majestic remnants of the old pecan groves and orchards planted by the first settlers of Ridgeland and the Highland Colony are scattered throughout the City. Notably, one such orchard can be found at Freedom Ridge Park. Many pecan trees would have been planted circa 1896, making them over 125 years old today.

Trees are considered important community resources because of

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unique or noteworthy characteristics or values. Such trees have been described as heritage, historic, landmark, legacy, special interest, significant, and official.

The City of Ridgeland Tree Ordinance regulates protection and removal of trees in the City of Ridgeland. The Historical Society of Ridgeland is committed to preserving the heritage and historic nature of area trees. In the City of Ridgeland trees remain as documentation of a historic past and continue to mark the future.

Historical Note: pǐ-kän - The name of the pecan tree (Carya illinoinensis) comes from the Native American word 'pacane,' which was used to describe "nuts requiring a stone to crack." European explorers encountered the pecan as early as 1541 when Hernando De Soto arrived in the Mississippi Valley region and the pecan was popular in French-occupied Louisiana. Among the Founding Fathers, Thomas Jefferson admired the pecan enough to plant trees at Monticello and sent George Washington seeds, which he used to plant pecans in his nursery at Mount Vernon. _ Special Collections, USDA National Agricultural Library







The City of Ridgeland held the groundbreaking ceremony in July for the South Highland Colony tank and well project. Representatives from Waggoner Engineering, Hemphill Construction, Ridgeland Chamber of Commerce, Mayor Gene McGee, the Board of Aldermen, Alan Hart, Director of Public Works, Pastor Justin Graves of First Ridgeland Baptist Church, City staff, and the media were all in attendance.

"This project demonstrates the City's continued focus on quality water. The new water tank and well are a vital addition to our City's infrastructure and will help us meet the growth demands in the area. Ridgeland has always been proud of its highly-rated water system, and water quality is one of our top priorities," stated Mayor McGee.

The need for the new tank and well was identified in the 2020 Water Master Plan that the Mayor and Board adopted. Soon after, the Mayor and Board began seeking possible funding sources. As growth continued, the need only grew more. "Thank you to the Mayor and Board of Aldermen for their vision and expectation to have the best water system in the State. These leaders truly understand and respect the importance of water quality and what it means to the success of a community," stated Alan Hart. The 1,000,000-gallon Water Storage Tank will increase our storage capacity by 30%. This increased capacity will allow Ridgeland to continue to pursue growth in commercial businesses, new neighborhoods, and other economic development opportunities. This tank and well project is designed to improve water quality by delivering even fresher water than we are already delivering to this area. This well is planned to increase the pumping capacity in Ridgeland by 20%.

Waggoner Engineering and Hemphill Construction have partnered with the City on this project.

"Mayor McGee successfully got a Congressional Spending Request

through the State and Tribal Assistance Grant program in 2023. A special thanks goes out to Senator Roger Wicker, Senator Cindy Hyde-Smith, and Congressman Michael Guest for their support of the funding request. As time went on, costs continued to escalate faster than ever before, but we were able to introduce ARPA Funds into the funding strategy. Thanks to the State of Mississippi and our local delegation, we received an MCWI Grant to match the ARPA Funds we pledged to the project. There are very few local dollars going toward the completion of this project," stated Alan Hart.

This is one of many efforts the City is working on to enhance the long term sustainability of our water system.





RIDGELAND TENNIS CENTER UPGRADES ARE COMPLETE

The City of Ridgeland announced in June the completion of several upgrades at the Ridgeland Tennis Center, one of Mississippi's largest public tennis facilities.

LED Lighting Installation: The first major project completed was the installation of new LED lighting on all of the tennis courts. This project involved replacing the old lighting system, which had been in place for 30 years, with state-of-the-art LED lights. The upgrade was made possible through the Land and Water Conservation Fund, Project Number 28-00701. The City received a grant in the amount of \$100,000, which helped to fund the lighting project.

Court Resurfacing: In February 2024, we successfully resurfaced Courts 1 – 6. The total cost for this project was \$44,000. The resurfacing work will significantly enhance the playing experience by providing improved court conditions.

Current Court Configuration: As a result of our continued efforts to improve and enhance our facilities, we have fifteen tennis courts in excellent condition. Additionally, two of our tennis courts have been converted into four pickleball courts to meet the growing demand for this sport.

These updates highlight our commitment to providing top-notch facilities for our community and ensuring the Ridgeland Tennis Center remains a destination for tennis and pickleball enthusiasts.

Building Department of the Year





This award recognizes the extraordinary performance of the entire department and is based on several factors, including, but not limited to, the number of permits issued, the monetary amount of permits issued, and the efficiency of the inspectors. The award also recognizes leadership in the profession and is chosen by a group of peers in the association.

"This award is representative of a team effort," said Bryan Johnson, "We all work to support one another." Alan Hart added, "I'm grateful for the commitment this team has to fulfilling the mission of the Department as established by the Mayor and Board. This Department is a major component of Economic Development, which has supported the growth we have enjoyed for many years." The City of Ridgeland proudly managed more than \$102 Million in building permits between June 2023 and May 2024.

Drew Smith serves as the Ridgeland Building Official and is supported by a team including Scott Swinny, Tally Berry, Robert Ray, Steven Ramsey, Jordan Lohman, Karen Knight, Leslie Thomas, Bayleigh Sears, and Ava Murphy. The Building Department operates in the Community Development Division and is led by Bryan Johnson under the direction of the Public Works Director, Alan Hart.

Mayor Gene McGee said, "I am very proud of the men and women in the Building Department and what they do to make Ridgeland a place where people want to be. This team works hard to provide the safety of our residents and visitors and protect property values by enforcing the Building Codes and Ordinances."

Mississippi Municipal League Excellence Award



The Mississippi Municipal League (MML) honored the 2024 Municipal Excellence Awards Winners at the 93rd Annual MML Conference Award Luncheon held in Biloxi, Mississippi at the Mississippi Coast Coliseum and Convention Center on June 26. The Excellence Awards program, which began in 1993, recognizes cities that utilize innovative problem solving, excellence in management, citizen participation and community partnerships to provide increased services and a better quality of life for its local citizenry. The competition is divided into two population categories: under 10,000 and over 10,000. Within each population category, cities can vie for awards in City Spirit, Planning and Economic Development, Public Safety and Public Works. Judges also select one application as the Best Overall.

Public Works - Over 10,000 City of Ridgeland "South Highland Colony Parkway Improvements"

To land the single largest economic development project in the state's history, among other important economic development projects in the vicinity, the City of Ridgeland planned and made significant infrastructure investments to the southern end of Highland Colony Parkway. As a result, the City of Ridgeland landed Southern Beverage and Amazon Web Services. The planning of this project called for an innovative way to rehabilitate the street infrastructure. A team of engineers planned a solution to make point repairs to the street base using geotextile fabrics and limestone to quickly stabilize each failed area. Profile milling was performed to create a level surface to lay new asphalt on top of the old road and repaired base, increasing the structural capacity of the road to support 80,000 lb. loads, which was necessary to support the truck traffic associated with Southern Beverage, a \$30,000,000 investment in Ridgeland. During the same time, the City of Ridgeland set out to improve the water quality and capacity for that area of the city. The unique innovation of this public works project is the complex funding strategy that includes federal, state, and local funding and the speed in which the permit and plans were prepared. The water tank and well project bid has been awarded and will be built prior to the opening of the first phase of the AWS data center. As a result of the innovative strategy to deliver the project, AWS plans to invest \$4 billion in what is likely to be the first of several phases that will span multiple years. The Phase 1 Ridgeland location will be home to 200 new jobs with an average annual wage of \$80,000.


