

CELEBRATING THE PAST LEADS TO A HOPEFUL FUTURE





THE CITY OF RIDGELAND WRAPS UP THE 125TH ANNIVERSARY YEAR

The City of Ridgeland concluded its 125th anniversary celebration with an event at the Waller Craft Center on December 29. Ridgeland was founded on December 29, 1899. Throughout the year, the City honored its rich history, vibrant culture, and ongoing growth with a variety of events, projects, and community initiatives. This year-long celebration invited residents, businesses, and visitors to commemorate this milestone in Ridgeland's story.









Here's a look at the key moments and highlights that told the story of Ridgeland's past, present, and future.

CITY, STATE, AND FEDERAL RECOGNITION:

Ridgeland's 125th anniversary celebrations began with a City proclamation, followed by resolutions from the Mississippi State Senate and House of Representatives recognizing the milestone. OFFICIAL RIDGELAND TREE - THE PECAN:





PAthways Program is Next Level!

At Highland Elementary, the PAthways program is bringing next-level teaching not only to its gifted students but also to the whole school. Since taking the lead of the program in 2022, PAthways teacher Jennifer Edwards has been aiming to provide her students with unique learning opportunities that they can share with the entire school. This year's Highland Hoax did just that.

In September, students entered the building to find their beloved school had been vandalized by a horrendous prankster. The hallways were trashed with toilet paper in a senseless act of crime. As this was the start of their semester-long Forensic Science Unit, the 5th-grade PAthways class quickly jumped on the case and found the culprit behind this.

They worked hard to examine the crime scene and collect evidence. Over several weeks, students listened to suspect testimonies and conducted numerous science experiments to narrow in on the culprit of the "Highland Hoax." The school was updated on the investigation and suspect elimination each week when passing the "Suspect Wall" along the main hallway. The PAthways students provided evidence as to why each suspect was eliminated from suspicion based on the experiments conducted in class that week.

When the class was confident they had enough evidence to send a suspect to



trial, they worked together to compose a mock trial skit that they acted out for the entire school. This skit allowed students to see first-hand how each suspect was eliminated. Students in the audience were also chosen as jurors, made notes throughout the trial, and determined the suspect's outcome based on evidence presented at trial.



After the unit, the 5th grade class visited the Thad Cochran United States Courthouse in Jackson. Clerk Arthur Johnston led students on a guided tour and discussed court proceedings with students, comparing it to their recent experience in the mock trial.

"The facility's location alongside I-55 will increase our visibility, emphasizing our footprint in Madison County. Watching projects of this magnitude come to fruition fills me with pride for Holmes and excitement for our future students and constituents." Thrash Commercial Contractors, JH&H Architects Planners Interiors, Benchmark Engineering & Surveying, LLC, and Smithers Engineers + Consultants will make up the team designing and building the new facility. In addition to the classrooms and offices for the various health science programs, the new facility will also provide a large multipurpose space to be used as a shared resource. With banquet seating for 350 and lecture-style seating for 530, Holmes will be able to accommodate more group events for the local community.


So many fun and exciting programs are happening at the library for all ages. Here is a sampling of the programs we offer for all ages. For ages 0-2, we have Sensory Play for Littles. At this program, parents/caregivers and their children can play with various sensory materials such as a ball pit, musical instruments, soft books, puppets, and more, which aid in developing physical, sensory, and emotional learning skills. It's a great time for everyone and a fun opportunity to make new friends!

For ages 3-5, we have story times every week. Children and their parents/caregivers listen to stories, engage in movement and songs, and make fun crafts at storytime. The City of Ridgeland has achieved remarkable milestones over the past few years, showcasing its commitment to innovation, infrastructure, and community well-being. With strategic partnerships at the local, state, and federal levels, Ridgeland has secured significant investments, launched transformative projects, and enhanced the quality of life for its residents.



From welcoming Amazon Web Services and Topgolf to the preliminary planning of the Performing Arts Center, Ridgeland sets a standard for economic development and urban planning. Major initiatives such as the annexation of new areas, groundbreaking drainage and water system improvements, and award-winning community projects highlight the City's forward-thinking approach.

Highlights Include:

AMAZON WEB SERVICES:

A new data center is under construction in the City of Ridgeland. The City of Ridgeland partnered with the Madison County Board of Supervisors, Madison County Economic Development Authority, the State of Mississippi, the Mississippi Development Authority, and Entergy to land this incredible investment. This development will significantly boost the Ridgeland economy in the near term.

TOPGOLF RIDGELAND AT PRADO VISTA:

This exciting new development opened on December 20, 2024, and offers an exciting form of dining and entertainment to Ridgeland. The City of Ridgeland partnered with PraCon Development and the State of Mississippi to attract this prospect. Additional facilities within the Prado Vista Development will be announced in 2025. Expected additions include offices, medical offices, hotels, a grocery store, additional entertainment venues, retail shops, and a residential section with single-family homes and townhomes.

FREEDOM RIDGE PARK AND RIDGEWOOD ROAD DRAINAGE IMPROVEMENTS:

The City of Ridgeland began working on restoring the detention capacity of the Freedom Ridge pond several years ago. The City grew the \$500,000 locally funded project into a much bigger one using less local funds. Madison County Supervisors granted the City of Ridgeland \$2 Million in federal ARPA funds, and the City of Ridgeland matched those funds with \$1.83 Million in MCWI funds for use on drainage improvements. The City also secured \$1 Million from the Mississippi Outdoor Stewardship Trust Fund to enhance the wildlife habitat, adding trails, native plant species, and interpretive signage. The innovative funding strategy eliminated the use of local funds from the project. It expanded the project from a simple

drainage improvement to include an Ecotourism Park addition to Freedom Ridge Park.

SOLID WASTE MASTER PLAN:

Following the successful annexation of westernmost Ridgeland, the City prepared and adopted a Solid Waste Master Plan to establish policies for the collection and disposal of solid waste (trash) and forever control the future of landfills in Ridgeland. Crossing. In addition to already providing water to the area, the City immediately became the first responder for Fire and Police. The City has performed overlays on some streets, updated street signage, and installed street lights at most intersections to improve visibility and safety. The City continues roadside maintenance, litter control, and hazard tree removal as often as possible.





ANNEXATION:

The City of Ridgeland completed another annexation that expanded the City limits to North County Line Road between West County Line Road and Greens

SOUTH HIGHLAND COLONY PARKWAY TANK AND WELL:

The City of Ridgeland broke ground on a new \$11,000,000 water tank and groundwater supply well. Leaders worked to leverage a local share of a little over \$500,000 by obtaining nearly \$10,500,000 in federal funding through ARPA, MCWI, and EPA program funding. The grant awards are important to protect the balance of the funds for the water and sewer fund so that water rates remain low.

ADVANCED WATER METER PROJECT:

Ridgeland's water meters have been converted to cellular communication with the exception of two trailer parks. These two areas will soon become private. The project was 100% funded by federal ARPA and MCWI funding. The upgrades include customer access to the EyeOnWater App. All water account

holders are encouraged to download the App to their smartphones to learn about their water usage and set up leak notifications. Quick notifications about a leak can save customers hundreds to thousands of dollars.

LIQUOR STORE ZONING:

Ridgeland leadership worked with the Mississippi Legislature to pass a Bill that allowed municipalities to pass regulations governing the placement of liquor stores. Ridgeland was experiencing an oversaturation of liquor stores and was able to pass zoning regulations that established buffers to avoid incompatible land use adjacencies.

AWARDS AND RECOGNITION:

Ridgeland continues to excel and be recognized for outstanding professionals and accomplishments. The South Highland Colony Parkway Rebuild Project was awarded MML's top award, the Award of Excellence, which aided in attracting Southern Beverage and AWS Data Center projects. The Jackson Street Master Plan was awarded Best Small Area Project from the MS Chapter of the American Planning Association. Keep Ridgeland Beautiful won multiple first-place awards and Circle of Excellence Awards from Keep Mississippi Beautiful for the Committee's outstanding work. Because of the successful recycling programs, the City of Ridgeland has won the Enhance Award from MEDQ multiple times. The City of Ridgeland was awarded the Outstanding Achievement Award for Overall Impression by America in Bloom. Mayor McGee was awarded the MCBL&F Visionary Award and the STS Tourism Award. The City of Ridgeland was chosen as one of the National League of Cities 100 Cities. Most recently, we celebrated the 17th year as a Tree City USA and 2nd time Bronze Level recognition as a Bicycle Friendly Community.

RIDGELAND CITY HALL: On February 14, 2021, the City of Ridgeland cut the ribbon on the new City Hall at 100 West School Street. This day marked the beginning of a new image of the City of Ridgeland, an image of excellence. On December 17, 2024, the Board of Aldermen officially named the Gene F. McGee City Hall building in honor of his outstanding dedication to the community.

MAYOR'S YOUTH COUNCIL:

The Mayor's Youth Council was launched in 2024. The council provides students with a learning experience of the inner workings of city government and public service. The inaugural class includes 28 students from various public and private schools around the community. Members attend Mayor and Board of Aldermen meetings, monthly council meetings, and volunteer in the community.

EAST COUNTY LINE ROAD IMPROVEMENTS PROJECT:

The City of Ridgeland partnered with the City of Jackson to replace the traffic signal technology and repave County Line Road from South Wheatley Street to Old Canton Road. The two entities were awarded \$1,840,000 in Federal STBG funding. Ridgeland and Jackson each contributed a 10% cost share. The project was completed in 2024.

LAKE HARBOUR DRIVE REHABILITATION PROJECT:

The City of Ridgeland was awarded \$3,910,000 in federal funds with a 20% match requirement. A portion of the match requirement will be paid by \$500,000 in funds received from the State of Mississippi. The project will replace sunken curb sections, remove the dips in the road caused by settlement, and overlay the entire road from Christine Drive to Northpark Drive. The project is expected to begin in 2026.

I-55 LED LIGHTING UPGRADES AND TRAFFIC MONITORING SYSTEM PROJECT:


The City of Ridgeland was awarded \$575,000 in federal STGB funds with a 20% match requirement. The project will replace the light fixtures from Old Agency Road to the northern city limits with new LED fixtures and add PTZ cameras for traffic monitoring. The project is expected to begin in the summer of 2025.

HIGHLAND COMMERCE DRIVE:

The City of Ridgeland continues to work on this long-range project. The total project costs are approximately \$40 Million, which \$10.7 Million has been secured to date. The project team is preparing for environmental review and property acquisition as leadership continues to secure state and federal funding. Once complete, the road will serve as a 2-way frontage road along I-55 and I-220 that connects Lake Harbour Drive to Highland Colony Parkway. The road will serve as a valuable truck route, creating hundreds of developable properties in the technical industrial park.

PURPLE CREEK AND FREEDOM RIDGE DRAINAGE PROJECT:

This \$6.5 Million project is a multiphased project funded by ARPA, MCWI, and MOSTF funding. The City of Ridgeland is utilizing a portion of its federal ARPA funds, and Madison County awarded \$2 Million of its ARPA funds to the City. The City matched those funds with MCWI federal funding. The City was also awarded \$1 Million from the Mississippi Outdoor Stewardship Trust Fund to enhance the drainage project. In the end, the City will improve the detention capacity in the purple creek basin to reduce downstream flooding. The MOSTF funds will add an eco-tourism feature to Freedom Ridge Park, which will include trails, native landscaping, bridges,





and interpretive signage. Additional phases of work include flood mitigation projects along a Purple Creek tributary along Ridgewood Road.

WHEATLEY STREET ROAD IMPROVEMENTS PROJECT:

Madison County awarded the City of Ridgeland \$3,487,000 in county bond funds and ARPA funds for improvements to Wheatley Street. The project will include repairs to the drainage and sewer systems under the road and rehabilitation of the road. The project will likely be divided into phases, with the first South Wheatley Street phase beginning in the fall of 2025.

US HIGHWAY 51 / LAKE HARBOUR DRIVE INTERSECTION IMPROVEMENTS:

Construction on the intersection project is expected to be completed in the spring of 2025. Once complete, the project will improve the dual left turn stacking for westbound traffic and add an important pedestrian sidewalk along the south side of the street. The construction is funded by a \$1,035,000 federal STBG grant with a 20% match requirement.

WEST JACKSON STREET CORRIDOR DEMONSTRATION

PROJECT: The City of Ridgeland was awarded \$1,948,800 by the Safe Streets for All (SS4A) federal grant program through FHWA. These funds will be used to demonstrate the effectiveness of the proposed improvements presented in the Jackson Street Master Plan. The concepts include creating on-street parking, reducing lane widths to slow traffic, adding a traffic signal at Perkins Street, improving sidewalk conditions, safer crosswalks, site furnishings, and landscaping. Engineers will collect utilization data before and after the demonstration project to support an SS4A implementation grant. City Leaders will continue to seek additional funding to implement the final improvements once the demonstration project and data collection are complete.

STEED ROAD MULTI-USE PATH:

The City of Ridgeland was awarded

\$894,425 in federal TA funds to extend a trail that completes a multiuse path from Old Agency Village to Sunnybrook Road and a connection north along Highland Colony Parkway to Township at Colony Park. The City has a 30% match requirement for the construction effort. The project is expected to begin late 2025.

EPA STAG GRANT PROJECTS:

The City of Ridgeland was awarded \$3,500,000 in federal EPA STAG grant funding for water-related projects. A portion of the funds was earmarked for the South Highland Colony Parkway Tank and Well Project. The remainder is used for water line extensions in various locations throughout the City of Ridgeland, including West County Line Road and Colony Park Boulevard.

COLONY PARK BOULEVARD AREA INFRASTRUCTURE IMPROVEMENTS:

The City of Ridgeland is adding a new water line along a portion of Colony Park Boulevard and a new sanitary sewer interceptor to serve the area. The project is funded with \$2 Million in County-transferred federal ARPA funds and a \$2 Million grant from the State of Mississippi. In addition to the water and sewer improvements, the City expects to add traffic signals to improve safety and access to the Prado Vista (Topgolf area) development and Ridgeland High School.

PURPLE CREEK AND EMCSDS SEWER INTERCEPTOR REHABILITATION:

The City of Ridgeland used 100% of the ARPA and MCWI federal funds to rehab sewer interceptors. The total project cost was \$1.3 Million. The rehabilitated sections will reduce failed areas and stormwater inflow and infiltration, reducing the long-term cost of paying for sewer treatment.

HAZARD TREE REMOVAL:

On January 6, 2025, the City of Ridgeland began removing 1,342 hazard trees and limbs throughout the City. The project is expected to take 6 months to complete. The City hired an arborist to identify the trees, primarily those that died from drought and pine beetles. The City awarded the contract to Deep Roots Construction for \$975,000.

LANDSCAPE MATERIAL REPLACEMENT:

The City of Ridgeland has budgeted \$500,000 to repair irrigation systems and replace dead plant material throughout the City. Work began earlier this year and will continue through the winter of 2025-2026.

AUTOMATED SIDE LOAD RECYCLING:

The City of Ridgeland requested proposals for recycling services and awarded the contract to Waste Management. The new Automated Side-Load trucks help reduce the overall cost of recycling by eliminating personnel and improving safety. Waste Management continues to work to educate on proper can placement and orientation. The City encourages you to utilize the Recycling Rewards program. Further information is available on the City's website.

CITY-WIDE TRAFFIC SIGNAL PROJECT:

The City completed the city-wide traffic signal replacement project. The project included adding battery backup systems, camera detection, and hardware upgrades in the cabinet. The result is better monitoring, better detection, and a better ability to adjust nearly every traffic signal in Ridgeland. Many of the signals are now compatible with the Travel Safely App.

LITTER CONTROL:

The City of Ridgeland uses personnel and inmates to collect litter from the City's right-of-ways, including the interstate. Thousands of bags are collected and disposed of every year. The cost of litter control is nearly \$100,000 annually. Encourage your friends not to litter. Your tax dollars can go to better services.

WELL REPLACEMENTS AND TANK MAINTENANCE:

The City of Ridgeland fully rehabilitated the Western well and the School Street Well. The City is partnered with Southern Corrosion for regular tank maintenance, which includes cleaning and painting the tanks inside and out to keep the system in its best condition.

RESIDENTIAL RENTAL INSPECTION CODE:

The Mayor and Board of Aldermen adopted a Residential Rental Inspection Code to provide a process to ensure quality housing for renters. The Code requires annual registration and inspections between vacancies. It applies to all rental property, including single-family homes, townhomes, duplexes, and apartments.

HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE DAY:

Annually, the City of Ridgeland partners with Madison County and the City of Madison to host Household Hazardous Waste Day at alternating sites. The event will be held on March 15, 2025, in the City of Ridgeland at Northpark. It supports and encourages the safe disposal of paints, chemicals, tires, batteries, electronics, etc.

MOSQUITO CONTROL:

The City of Ridgeland selected Vector Disease Control, Inc. to provide the service for an integrated mosquito management program. The program includes education, surveillance, treatment, Chemical and Disease Testing, and Emergency Response.

The goal is to chemically treat areas that need to be treated using the right treatment. The City used social media and public notices to promote best practices for mosquito bite prevention and protection.



DIRECTIONAL BORING ORDINANCE:

The City of Ridgeland implemented a new order to reduce the impact boring crews were having on the community. Access to the fiber network remains a priority for Ridgeland, but boring crews were moving faster than our water repair crews could manage. The ordinance placed restrictions on hours of installation and length of boring.

FREEDOM RIDGE PHASE 2 PARK EXPANSION:

The City of Ridgeland continues to seek funding for the expansion of Freedom Ridge Park. The hospitality industry must remain relevant in recreation and travel sports. Ridgeland has long been known for its quality fields, but other communities have advanced in the number of fields and are better equipped to host tournaments. The City plans to add ball fields, pickleball courts, and more to improve our ability to host tournaments.

RIDGELAND PERFORMING ARTS CENTER:

This arts facility has been in the Ridgeland plans since 2008. The time is now! Ridgeland has retained Dean Architecture to design the facility, and leadership is actively seeking naming rights sponsors. Officials hope to launch a capital campaign in 2025 after naming the sponsors. The facility will include a 1,200-seat theater, a black box theater, a conference space, and several art galleries. Please contact the City of Ridgeland for more information regarding naming rights opportunities.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT:

Over the last 4 years, the City of Ridgeland has successfully recruited and retained businesses. The new retail shops, offices, restaurants, hotels, etc. are too many to name. Ridgeland's leadership continues to focus on sustainability through proper land use planning, funding acquisition, and outstanding leadership. Ridgeland has long been successful in this area and has avoided a tax millage increase in 35 years. Many more exciting projects are in the planning stages and will be announced as soon as possible.

CITY OF RIDGELAND FIRE DEPARTMENT ANNOUNCES NEW LIFE-SAVING VEHICLE

The City of Ridgeland Fire Department is proud to announce the acquisition of a 2024 Wildland Extreme Type 6 brush/rescue truck. This state-of-the-art vehicle, purchased from Emergency Equipment Professionals (EEP) and built by Boise Mobile Equipment (BME), will enhance the department's emergency response capabilities.



The new brush/rescue truck replaces a 20-year-old Rescue 4 at Station Four. It is equipped with advanced features, including a 300-gallon water tank, a separate diesel engine to power the pump, a 10-gallon Class A foam tank, and off-road firefighting capabilities.

Designed to meet the needs of the annexed rural area on Ridgeland's west side, the truck will respond to all EMS calls—such as medical emergencies and motor vehicle accidents—in District Four. It will also support brush fire responses across the entire City of Ridgeland Fire Department service area.

"This new brush/rescue truck is a critical addition to our fleet, ensuring we can effectively serve the expanding needs of our community," said Fire Chief Matt Bailey. "With its advanced capabilities, this vehicle will allow us to respond more efficiently to emergencies in rural areas and beyond. The safety of our residents is always our top priority, and this investment reflects our commitment to providing the highest level of service."


