



LETTER FROM THE MAYOR

Currently, there are many projects in progress or will be beginning soon in our City. I thought it would be a good idea to let each of you know what these projects

are, why they are being done, and the projected completion date. It is apparent that some projects will impact traffic and cause some inconvenience, but all of this is necessary to continue to make improvements in our great City.

Lake Harbour Widening from Highway 51 to Northpark Drive – This project will widen the 1.6 miles of Lake Harbour Drive to five lanes from Highway 51 to Northpark Drive. Five traffic signals will be rebuilt, and it will also include a ten-foot-wide multiuse path for the entire length of the project. At this time, utility line relocation should be completed by the end of September. Once completed, we can request MDOT to allow us to bid the project, hopefully by late fall. The time frame on construction of this project is approximately two years.

Rice Road and Pear Orchard Signal – A new traffic signal with a battery backup power supply and new turn lanes in each direction is currently under construction. It should be complete, weather permitting by the first of January 2012.

New Water Line on Highway 51 - This new water line will connect the Drury Inn, Holiday Inn Express and Logan's Restaurant to our system. This project should start soon after Labor Day and should be completed in January 2012.

Old Agency Road Bridge Rehabilitation – We will replace the existing bridge over White Oak Creek on Old Agency Road. This project should be under construction in a few weeks and should be completed by the end of the year.

Lake Harbour Drive Extension from Highway 51 to Highland Colony Parkway – This project includes construction of a four-lane road with a median from Highway 51 at Lake Harbour Drive to Highland Colony Parkway. It will include a ten-foot-wide multiuse trail. We have received approval from MDOT to begin final design and anticipate this phase will take approximately one year. Hopefully, this project construction can begin by early 2014.

The projects listed above will cost almost \$57 million. Federal or State grants will pay for \$25 million. As you can see, we are getting almost twice the dollar value for what we are spending of local funds.

The Madison-Ridgeland Interchange – The interchange will be built by MDOT, and according to our information, this project should begin by early 2012. The construction date is dependent upon some utility lines being moved by Entergy and the City of Madison, but those relocations are well under way. Once this project is built, we will have a great new interchange that will reduce some of the traffic impact on the Jackson Street/Old Agency Road area, as well as County Line Road. It will facilitate the movement of traffic, both north and south, and east and west. The cost of this project is estimated to be \$180 million with Ridgeland's share of \$5,260,000.

As you know, the City of Ridgeland has been working vigorously on our Twenty-Year Master Plan which includes two very important projects. One of those projects includes the development of a City Center on Highway 51 at School Street. The land site has been used, in the past, to make bridge beams. I'm excited to tell you that the City has purchased the property, and the former landowner is in the process of cleaning it. Since the City now owns the property, we can earnestly begin the plan of the new City Center. You will be receiving many updates on this project.

The other major Master Plan project that we are working on now is the Redevelopment of the Southeast Ridgeland Area. We will be going back to the legislature again this year, seeking special legislation to assist us with some of the funding of the infrastructure for this area. We believe this redevelopment is critical to our city, and we will not rest until this area is developed in the way the Master Plan depicts.

As you can see, there is a lot going on in our great City. I hope that anytime you have questions, you will feel free to call so that we can keep you updated on all of these projects.

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

SOW AND GROW COMMUNITY GARDEN TO CONTINUE INTO THE FALL

The Ridgeland "Sow & Grow" Community Garden is a new venture that began this spring as a project of the Community Garden Subcommittee of the Ridgeland Healthy Hometown Committee. Due to the combined efforts of community volunteers, an area on City Hall property was prepared for gardening, and the project was promoted through local newspapers.

The project could not have happened without the time, talents, and energy of Jerry Williams, a Ridgeland resident who fills his retirement with maintaining his home landscape, serving as Homebound Coordinator for First Baptist Jackson, and spending time with his grandchildren and family. Anna Brandon, local volunteer and active senior. Mike Mc-Collum, Director of Public Works, and David Overby, City Clerk and Director of Finance and Administration, also contributed free time to the project.

"The summer garden has been a success, especially for a new venture," said Jerry Williams. "All the garden beds

were taken on the initial offering, and a great variety of vegetables were raised.

"Some of the gardeners had been gardening all their life and some were novices, brand new to gardening," adds Williams. "We had senior citizens and retirees, two Cub Scout packs, one Alderman, members of a homeowners' association, and individuals. Overall, 18 beds were worked. The homeowners' association even decorated their garden with a birdhouse and flowers. Master Gardeners were available as advisors."

Many gardeners participated in order to grow vegetables for their own food. However, Cub Scout Pack 184, Highlands Presbyterian Church, grew and harvested vegetables for MadCAAP (Madison Countians Allied Against Poverty), scheduling deliveries and pick ups of produce as it became ready for harvest.

While the summer garden is ending, a fall garden will begin. "If you would like to start a garden, it's not too late to claim a garden bed in the Ridgeland Community Garden," according to Williams. Current gardeners will have a right-of-firstrefusal on their garden bed for the fall.

"Most of the summer gardeners have

spent a lot of money, time, and effort adding amendments to their beds," said Williams. "So, we feel it is best if the fall gardeners are responsible for tilling up their existing beds and reworking them to their best advantage."

The Mississippi State University Extension Service is a good resource for garden information. According to the Extension Service, September plantings could include broccoli, cabbage, carrots, cauliflower, lettuce, and turnips. Collard greens, beets, mustard greens, and spinach can be planted in October.

"Fall is an exciting time to garden because the temperature is cooler. We expect great participation for the fall garden," said Williams.

We will have a contest this fall for the Best Maintained Garden. This contest will be judged by an independent panel. The contest will not be based on amount of production, but on maintenance of the garden. We will have prizes for all fall garden participants. FALL LANDSCAPING WILL REDUCE STORMWATER RUNOFF

As the leaves begin to fall, this may be a good time to clean out your flower beds, thin out overgrown plants, and transplant perennials and trees. Fall is an excellent time for transplanting because the weather is cooler and plants are not using as much water. Just be sure to not move a plant that is still in bloom.



Most perennials can be moved by simply digging a large shovelful of soil and roots with the plant and placing it in the new location. While relocating perennials, remember this is also a good time to divide those that are overgrown. If the plant has outgrown its area, remove half the plant, leaving the other part to fill in the area. Dispose of any deceased plant material.


Once perennials have been moved, water thoroughly the first few weeks, when the top two to three inches of soil becomes dry. Applying about three to four inches of mulch (choose from straw, mulched leaves, or wood shavings) around perennials when transplanting in the fall keeps soil temperatures more consistent and helps hold moisture, thus reducing the amount of water needed once the plant becomes established in its new location.

Allow plants to become established before fertilizing—plants moved this fall may not need fertilizing until next spring. Overfertilization is a common problem, and excess fertilizer can soak into groundwater or contaminate rivers or lakes. Use slow-release fertilizers on areas where the potential for water contamination is high, such as sandy soils, steep slopes, compacted soils, and edges of water bodies. Do not apply pesticides or fertilizers before or during rain due to the strong likelihood of contaminating stormwater runoff into public waters.

With the falling leaves, be sure to keep storm gutters and drains clean. Decomposing vegetative matter can clog storm systems and result in property damage as well as flooding. Prevent erosion and runoff by restoring bare patches

in your lawn or covering them with mulch.

A message from the City of Ridgeland Community Development Department and Public Works Department



The City of Ridgeland has an Anti-Litter Ordinance. It addresses garbage, refuse, rubbish, and waste material which can create a danger to public health, safety, and welfare. State Statute 97-15-29 also makes it unlawful to litter. Fines for littering violations in Ridgeland are \$223.50 or \$250 for ignitable substances such as cigarette butts.

It is against the law to throw or deposit litter on any private property or in any public place within the City of Ridgeland. The owner of private property is responsible for maintaining his/ her premises free of litter and utilizing private receptacles for collection. Persons owning or occupying property shall keep the sidewalk in front of their premises free of litter.

No person shall throw or deposit litter in any public place except in public receptacles. No person shall throw or deposit litter in any body of water. Please remember that litter washes into the storm drains and enters our waterways.

Litter should not be thrown from a vehicle. Trucks or other vehicles should be loaded so that the contents do not blow out and deposit litter upon any street or public place. Wheels or tires should not deposit mud, dirt, and litter onto any street or public place.

Any person found violating any provision of the local or state ordinance is committing a misdemeanor in the City of Ridgeland and shall be fined or imprisoned, or both. The Ridgeland Police Department has increased its efforts in litter violation enforcement. Please do your part to help preserve the quality of life in Ridgeland and prevent harm to the public health, safety, and welfare by using waste receptacles instead of littering.

Ridgeland is the only municipal department in the state offering this program.

According to www.rad-systems.com, the goal of R.A.D. is to provide realistic self-defense options to women, regardless of their physical conditioning. Students at all levels of ability, age, experience and strength will be provided with techniques and information that can be effectively used from the first day of class. R.A.D. is not a martial arts program, nor does it require students to be athletes in training to succeed.

Every student receives a manual for reference and practice. Once a student has completed a R.A.D. program, their signed manual becomes a ticket for free lifetime return and practice with any R.A.D. instructor in the U.S. and Canada. R.A.D. is the only self-defense program endorsed by the International Association of Campus Law Enforcement Administrators.

Officer Jonathan Wolfe with the Ridgeland Police Department is a nationally certified R.A.D. Instructor with 15 years of law enforcement experience. He will be leading the courses in Ridgeland. "It will be a very fun and informative class with practical uses. It teaches women how to get away from a situation." During the course, the students experience hands-on simulations with the instructor in a padded suit. This 12-hour course will be taught over four days at two host locations. MY HELMET SAVED MY LIFE

I am truly thankful that my husband, Colonel Roland Manuel, Sr., applies his favorite Army standard "Lead by example" as he wears his headgear and gloves when riding. For years, he has insisted that my son and I do the same. We do.

I recall reading a cycling article that stated, "In the United States, helmets save one life per day." I am so grateful that on June 2, 2011, "It was my day."

My husband and I completed our routine evening ride along the beautiful multipurpose trail at Ridgeland, Mississippi. We took a break to sit by the water, then headed home less than 5 minutes away. Accidents are unexpected and can happen any time. What happened next was just an accident involving human error, equipment, and environment. As best we can figure, I rode through a patch of "Mississippi Gnats" (little flying buggy things) which impaired or distracted me. I probably hit my front brake and flipped over my bike. I hit the pavement head first. My headgear cracked but held together. I received serious lacerations and scrapes to my forehead and the right side of my face that required extensive surgeries with more to go. My right shoulder, right hip, left knee and both wrists were badly injured. Through it all, I know it would have been worse if I were not wearing my headgear.

We are grateful that Ridgeland, Mississippi, is bicycle friendly. Even more so, wearing a cycling helmet is required law and enforced by our Mayor and police officers. With this little note, my husband and I plan to take an active role in advocating cycling safety. We truly believe my helmet prevented more serious injuries and possibly saved my life.

Excellence in the Classroom

At Ann Smith Elementary, our goal is to create a positive learning environment from the very beginning. When our children first walk through the doors, they feel welcome and are encouraged to excel in the classroom.

Academic excellence is a long-standing tradition at ASE, as shown by the results of our Measures of Academic Progress (MAP) testing received in the spring. The MAP test is a universal screener required by the state of Mississippi and a tool the Madison County School District uses to measure growth and progress in the classroom. District officials use second-grade test results as an indicator for how the lower elementary schools will do on the MCT2 test, which begins in third grade.

Based on the calculations from the testing, our second-graders earned a score that's the equivalent of a STAR status, the highest rating under the state's accountability system.

"We're so thrilled with the results of this year's MAP testing," said ASE principal Kathy Rigsby. "It speaks well for our teachers, our parents, and, of course, our students. It just goes to show that our students are well-prepared in the classroom and will be successful in the future."

WHAT IS CLASSICAL CHRISTIAN EDUCATION?

Modern education focuses on teaching subjects. Classical educators focus on teaching students the tools for learning in preparation for further study of subjects after high school. "For the sole end of education is simply this: to teach men how to learn for themselves; and whatever instruction fails to do this is effort spent in vain." (Dorothy Sayers, The Lost Tools of Learning, 1947).

While students at classical schools do study the same subjects as students in nonclassical schools (history, math, science, English, etc.), they are required to study logic, Latin, and rhetoric, also. Classical education uses a methodology, referred to as "The Trivium" which organizes learning around the maturing capacity of the child's mind. The Trivium consists of three stages: grammar (grades 1-4), logic (grades 5–8), and rhetoric (grades 9–12).

In the grammar stage, the student's mind is ready to absorb information and facts (rules of phonics, spelling, grammar, poems, math facts, stories of history, and literature, etc.). By fifth grade, the child's mind begins to think analytically. Middle school students (logic stage) are less interested in finding out facts than in asking "Why?". In the logic stage, a child begins to pay attention to cause and effect, to the relationships among different fields of knowledge, and to the way facts fit together into a logical framework.

The final phase of classical education, "rhetoric stage," builds on the first two. At this point, the high school student learns to write and speak with force and originality. The student of rhetoric applies the rules of logic learned in middle school to the foundational information learned in the early grades and expresses his conclusions in clear and elegant language.

What makes a Christian classical school distinct is the use of The Trivium in conjunction with all subjects being taught from a Biblical worldview.

Specifically, the grammar phase of classical Christian education corresponds to knowledge, the logic phase to understanding, and the wisdom phase to rhetoric.

The grammar phase is supported by Romans 12:1-2 with "the transformation and renewal of the mind" setting the foundation in the revealed and absolute truths of God as found in Christ, the Scriptures, and all Creation. The logic phase continues by further training students to discern truth from error and falsehood. 
